

Almost 50 years of generous donor support has made DGH a centre of excellence with a reputation for punching above its weight in the healthcare sphere. The DGH Auxiliary have been loyal and passionate supporters of the hospital since before the doors even opened and have helped fund more than \$2 million worth of essential needs over the years. # Opening of The Deanne Reeve Pelvic Health Suite at Dartmouth General Hospital

February 25, 2025, saw the opening of a new, first-of-its-kind in Atlantic Canada pelvic health suite at Dartmouth General Hospital; a venture that was spearheaded by Dr. Scott Mawdsley and a handful of very generous donors, whose mission was to improve pelvic healthcare for women and men across Nova Scotia.

With the support of the inaugural Orchid Gala, Steele Auto Group, J&W Murphy Foundation, Dorothy and Dan Gibson, the Brien Family Foundation (in honour of Beth Brien), CIBC, Mark & Teri Sherman, and the Bowser Family, this suite will offer much needed urological and gynecological care to patients in the Halifax Regional Municipal area, and set a standard of care for the rest of the Nova Scotia when it comes to pelvic health.

This state-of-the-art suite is the new home for gynecology and urology procedures at DGH. Previously at DGH, cystoscopy procedures were performed in the endoscopy unit and hysteroscopies were performed in one of the hospital eight operating rooms.

Moving these procedures out of operating rooms and endoscopy suites and into the new purpose-built Suite will help free up ORs and endoscopy suites for procedures that must happen in these two areas, including colonoscopies and surgeries – helping to reduce wait times for patients. It will free up 250 hours of OR time and will also add capacity at DGH for men's and women's health – more than quadrupling the amount of urology procedures that can be performed each year.

More than 100 guests attended the ribbon-cutting event hosted at DGH in the Neville J. Gilfoy Wing.

The Suite was named for Deanne Reeve, a Nova Scotia woman who lost her life to cervical cancer in 2020.

The inaugural Orchid Gala was created to honour Deanne's memory and to raise funds to help advance women's healthcare in Nova Scotia. Dartmouth General Hospital was chosen as the first recipient of the Gala's proceeds and as the hospital to honour and pay tribute to Deanne's memory and legacy. We are deeply humbled by this honour.

Described as caring and very generous by her friends, Deanne's spirit lives on in the Suite and in the impact it will have for women's and men's health in the province.

We were honoured to be joined by members of Deanne's family who travelled from Newfoundland to be on hand for the celebration. During a heartfelt speech, Deanne's sister, Susan, shared a story of how their father had always said the Reeve name would end with him, as they had a family of all girls. But now, with the naming of the suite, the Reeve family name, and Deanne's legacy, will live on forever.

Dartmouth General Hospital's Deanne Reeve Pelvic Health Suite will have significant benefits not just to the surrounding area, but to all of Nova Scotia, as it will set a standard of care that will hopefully see adoption by other heathcare centres in the region.

Our heartfelt thanks to everyone who made this Suite possible, including our generous donors, Nova Scotia Health Innovation Hub, and the government of Nova Scotia. This is philanthropy in action and the power of partnership.

#### **Celebrating Another Year of Impact for PLANS Students!**

2024 saw the ninth cohort of PLANS (Promoting Leadership in Health for African Nova Scotians) Co-op students this complete impactful program, designed to increase the representation of African Nova Scotian and Black students in health professions.

This year will be the fifth year that DGH will serve as the proud hospital site for the PLANS program, thanks to the generous support of RBC and Killam Properties REIT.

For the first time ever, PLANS students had the opportunity to job-shadow at DGH last fall. Students shared the area of healthcare they were interested in, and were matched up for a half-day of job-shadowing with various departments in the hospital including diagnostic imaging, physiotherapy, and nursing.

DGH partners with Dalhousie University to deliver the PLANS Co-op Program. The program has grown over the years, and we are now seeing almost twice as many students as we did five years ago.

## Nova Scotia Health Opens New Geriatric Medicine Clinic on Dartmouth General Hospital Campus

Nova Scotia Health has expanded its Geriatric Medicine Clinic services to include a new location at 18 Acadia Street, part of the Dartmouth General Hospital campus. This addition aims to provide older adults in Dartmouth, as well as the Eastern Shore, with improved access to specialized care, addressing issues such as frailty, dementia, increased falls, and other age-related health concerns.

The clinic's design incorporates features such as calm, well-lit spaces, non-reflective flooring, and clear signage to create a comfortable environment for patients. A generous donation from the J&W Murphy Foundation, through the DGH Foundation, supported these enhancements to the space. "We love the culture at Dartmouth General Hospital that continues to encourage innovative approaches to patient care. We applaud the healthcare teams who have come together to bring this clinic to the Dartmouth community," said Lisa Murphy, spokesperson for the J&W Murphy Foundation.

"This project is a great example of government and donors working together to make the Geriatric Medicine Clinic a reality in Dartmouth - that's the magic of philanthropy in action," said Stephen Harding, President & CEO, DGH Foundation. "Thank you to the J&W Murphy Foundation for bringing this patient-centered investment in seniors' healthcare close to home."

With this new location, Nova Scotia Health now operates three Geriatric Medicine Clinics in the Central Zone, including sites at the Camp Hill Veterans' Memorial Building in Halifax and the Cobequid Community Health Centre in Lower Sackville. This expansion is expected to increase the number of new patients seen by up to 40%, helping older adults remain at home longer and reducing emergency department visits.



### Pain Management App Aims to Empower Patients Through Technology

Effective pain management plays a crucial role in healthcare. When pain is inadequately managed, it can lead to longer hospital stays, extended recovery periods, an increased risk of opioid misuse or addiction and poor surgical outcomes.

Dr. Emily Johnston, a Clinical Pharmacist in the department of Orthopedic Surgery in Nova Scotia Health, and Pharmacist, Innovation Champion at the Nova Scotia Health Innovation Hub is no stranger to pain management. Through her extensive experience on the trauma unit caring for orthopedic surgery patients, she has a deep commitment to empowering patients to take control of their pain, while ensuring effective communication between patients and healthcare providers.

Most recently, this passion has led to the creation of the Pain Coach App, which provides users with access to non-pharmaceutical resources for pain and anxiety management, such as guided imagery, breathing exercises, and instructional videos, while also supporting the use of medications.

The newly created app is in a trial phase and is supporting a select group of patients recovering from hip, knee or shoulder surgeries here at DGH. Running for one year, the study aims to evaluate the app's effectiveness in reducing pain and opioid use while maintaining positive pain management outcomes.

As a pharmacist with no technical experience, developing an app was a new challenge for Dr. Johnston. "I worked on the concepts for the app for over a year, with eight months of that spent in daily meetings with coders as we developed each individual feature." Says Johnston. "This was a steep learning curve for me, and I hope I can inspire others who may have innovative healthcare ideas but lack technical experience. Digital health solutions are really at the forefront of their adoption and I'm excited to be part of that."

Research such as this can't happen without funding. The clinical trial itself was funded through the DGH John and Judy Bragg Innovation Fund via the DGH Foundation which Dr. Johnston co-applied for with Dr. Jennifer Leighton, principal investigator of the study.

Ultimately, Dr. Johnston envisions the Pain Coach app being adopted across Nova Scotia Health as a standard of care for all arthroplasty patients, helping them feel more supported in managing their pain after surgery, and offering a new resource for pain management. Research is care, and clinical studies help translate research into potentially life-changing therapies that can help you, your friends and your loved ones.



#### African Nova Scotian Heart Health Research Program

On February 14th, more than 100 community members gathered at the Black Cultural Centre of Nova Scotia to hear findings and recommendations of a 5-year research project focused on the cardiovascular health of African Nova Scotians.

Funded by the TD Bank Group (TD) in 2020, the African Nova Scotian Heart Health Research Program engaged the Preston Township communities in heart healthy conversations, events, and research to address the disproportionately low number of African Nova Scotians seeking cardiovascular care at DGH.

Heart disease is a leading cause of death for adult Canadians and even higher for people of African descent.

DGH cardiologists identified that they were not seeing patients from the Preston Township (North Preston, East Preston, Cherry Brook, and Lake Loon), the largest multi-generational African descent communities in Canada, until the later stages of heart disease.

To help address this challenge, TD funded a partnership between the DGH Foundation and the Health Association of African Canadians (HAAC) to establish a baseline understanding of cardiac health issues and support the implementation of new and innovative approaches toward delivering culturally competent care.

The program consisted of four pillars that were supported by working committees that brought specific perspectives, actions, and deliverables:

- Faith
- Community
- History
- Research and Policy Development

This historic collaboration provided landmark data to help advance the state of cardiovascular health in African Nova Scotian populations.

The report identified next steps that will include:

- A heart healthy event to be held every February 14<sup>th</sup> at the Black Cultural Centre
- An official working partnership between HAAC and DGH to deliver and develop scholarship opportunities supporting African Nova Scotians and African Descended Communities.
- A commitment to improve in-hospital services as well as continuing outreach toward culturally competent care

This work and commitment by so many is guiding the collective interest in building the infrastructure that supports and continues to drive health equity in Nova Scotia. This is the power of partnership. This is philanthropy in action.

# How a Home Colon Cancer Screening Test Saved a Life: Judith's Story

As spring approached, Judith Kays was feeling great. In fact, if you asked her, she would say she was in the best health of her life. She was getting stronger, walking further and reaching healthy goals. Judith thrived on keeping busy but always made sure she had a good work-life balance and enjoyed her family time and socializing with friends. She was enjoying midlife and looking forward to her 56<sup>th</sup> birthday.

When her Fecal Immunochemical Test, more commonly referred to as the FIT, arrived in the mail shortly after her birthday in May, she completed the simple test, as she'd done in previous years, and mailed it back to the Colon Cancer Prevention Program. As part of her proactive healthcare routine, Judith was aware of the importance of regular mammograms, pap tests and the FIT.

FIT is a home-based screening kit that checks your stool for hidden blood and is exceptionally effective in detecting early potential signs of colorectal cancer. The kit is automatically mailed to Nova Scotians between the ages of 50 and 74 every two years as part of the Nova Scotian Colon Cancer Prevention Program.

Not giving it another thought, Judith continued on with work, family and friends, forgetting quickly that she'd even done the FIT. After all, she had no issues and was feeling happy and healthy.

While boating with her husband one afternoon, she got a call saying that she had an abnormal FIT result, followed by a recommendation to have a colonoscopy. No problem, Judith thought, it's common for people to have to have a few polyps removed.

Judith was booked for a colonoscopy at Dartmouth General Hospital and although she didn't know it at the time, she soon learned she was just one of the approximately 1,200 Nova Scotians who are called back annually in the province's Central Zone for additional testing because of abnormal results. Again, Judith left her colonoscopy being very optimistic and confident that she'd taken yet another proactive step in taking care of her health.

Two weeks later, she underwent a procedure to further assess the findings revealed during her colonoscopy. Judith was completely unprepared for the diagnosis that one of her polyps tested positive for colorectal cancer. Blindsided, her world stopped. She could barely comprehend the words her surgeon was saying. She didn't feel sick. She had no symptoms. As she states simply, everything was working down there - there were no issues. Judith and her husband were in the midst of planning a travel journey in the fall, not a cancer journey.

Nova Scotia has the highest rates of colorectal cancer in the country. Each year, 800 Nova Scotians are diagnosed with the disease. When caught in its early stages, this cancer is 90% curable.

Judith is a very grateful part of that statistic. She gives full credit to the FIT program for saving her life. "I don't even like to think about what my future could have looked like had I ignored that test for another few years," she says. "The less than five minutes it took me to actually open my mail, do the test and send it back is so much shorter than the extensive health challenges that could result from not doing the test!" She is also extraordinarily grateful to Dr. Riley Stewart and the DGH endoscopy team for helping her navigate her cancer journey with confidence and optimism.

Through this experience, Judith has become an enthusiastic and proud advocate for early screening. The FIT results caught her cancer early and she believes that more should be done to both talk about the importance of completing the FIT to increase return rates and to lower the age at which people will start to receive the test as she's personally seen more and more younger people being diagnosed with colorectal cancer. She's not alone.

Mark Gascoigne, who lost his father to colorectal cancer, founded Get Up There (GUT), an event that raises funds and awareness to support colorectal cancer screening and prevention. His tireless lobbying, fundraising efforts and determination were instrumental in bringing the FIT program to Nova Scotia in 2009. The very same test that is credited with saving Judith's life.

The FIT is 100% painless, free to Nova Scotians, and is easily completed at home, yet there's an issue. Less than half of the 185,000 people who receive the test in the mail each year complete and return it. Both Judith and Mark understand that there needs to be better participation. "We need more people thinking about prevention, completing the FIT and supporting the call for additional research and funding."

This spring, Judith joined Mark, Dr. Stewart, and other volunteers and participants to hike Wentworth, the largest alpine ski facility in Nova Scotia, to raise the funds needed to ensure that more people "Get Up There" to do their FIT.

Lives are saved through early detection and treatment of colorectal cancers. Judith Kays was one of those lives.

### DGH Auxiliary Donates \$62,000 To DGH Emergency Department

For more than 50 years the DGH Auxiliary has been supporting the needs of DGH patients and in that time, they have raised more than \$2 million to support innovation and exceptional care here at the hospital.

Recently, they stepped forward in their signature pink jackets with with a gift of \$62,000 to support new, upgraded telemetry monitoring equipment for DGH patients in the **Emergency Department.** 

This technology will allow our medical team to identify and act quickly on potential abnormal cardiac rhythms that may place patients at risk.

### **DGH Delivers Innovative, World-Class Training**

DGH is often referred to as a "living lab" for Nova Scotia Health. We are home to many dedicated professionals eager to test new ideas. Our surgeons and frontline healthcare workers are continuously looking for innovative ways to improve effectiveness, efficiency, reduce costs, and enhance patient outcomes. Their passion for improvement leads to advancements that benefit patients in HRM and beyond.

One recent example is when DGH hosted Canada's top ear, nose, and throat surgeons for a two-day live surgical workshop—the first of its kind in North America. The workshop introduced and provided practical training to participants from across Canada to continuous intraoperative neural monitoring (CIONM). This innovative technique continuously checks the nerve's function throughout thyroid surgery, significantly reducing the risk of nerve injuries such as permanent voice problems, difficulty swallowing, and reduced ability to exercise. Unlike older methods, which only checked nerve function intermittently, potentially missing damage until after it occurred, continuous monitoring allows surgeons to immediately identify and prevent possible nerve injury.

DGH surgeons Dr. Robin LeBlanc, Dr. Richard Balys, and Dr. Martin Corsten have been using this groundbreaking technique for over a year and were eager to provide a workshop to educate others on the technology. Working closely with inomed Canada, a global leader in CIONM technology, they organized the event, arranged operating room facilities, and secured Professor Neil Tolley from London, England, as the expert trainer. By the end of the session, Canada had several new surgeons that were well-trained in the new technology and completely understood its importance in improving patient outcomes.

CIONM contributes to patients spending less time under anesthesia and on the operating table and has elevated the quality of patient care and improved surgical outcomes. Best practices and the sharing of expertise continues, with DGH being recognized as a leader in promoting advanced training for surgeons nationwide. Dr. Balys believes that DGH provides unparalleled support and resources that empower us to bring innovative, world-class care directly to our patients.

### **Donors Bring Barrett's Esophagus Treatment to DGH**

For many people living with Barrett's Esophagus, traveling out of province for treatment was just another hurdle in an already stressful journey. But thanks to the power of philanthropy, that's now a thing of the past.

Barrett's Esophagus is a pre-cancerous condition that can develop in people with chronic acid reflux. But the good news is that a highly effective treatment called radiofrequency ablation (RFA) is now available right here at Dartmouth General Hospital, making care more accessible than ever before.

Until recently, patients had to travel several times a year to Moncton, New Brunswick—the only place in Atlantic Canada that offered this procedure. But thanks to the generous support of Dan, Lee-Anne, Danielle, and Mike Chassie, the J&W Murphy Foundation, and more than 600 community champions who supported the 2024 DGHF Annual Lobster Dinner & Auction, the hospital was able to purchase the necessary equipment to bring RFA treatment to Nova Scotia. This means less travel, lower costs, and a smoother recovery for patients and their families.

Darren Steele, one of the first patients to receive RFA at DGH, knows firsthand how lifechanging this is. Over the past five years, he and his family made 13 trips to Moncton for treatment. Now, with the procedure available locally, he can focus more on his health and less on the hassle of travel.

Dr. Robert Berger, a gastroenterologist at DGH, is thrilled to offer this gold-standard treatment close to home. "For patients at higher risk of esophageal cancer, RFA can make a significant difference," he explains. "Now, we can provide that care right here in Dartmouth."

This achievement is a testament to what is possible when donors come together to bring the very best healthcare treatments right here - to our community.

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
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
