
We're proud to help bring the next generation of healthcare to our patients, and that includes welcoming some amazing new medical professionals to our hospital and our community.

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
Ring Rescue: From Dartmouth General Hospital to ‘The Pitt’

A medical device company with roots in frontline emergency care at Dartmouth General Hospital is about to reach a worldwide audience on the popular, award-winning television series ‘The Pitt’.

Ring Rescue is a Nova Scotia-based medical device manufacturer. It was founded in 2018 by Dartmouth General emergency physician Dr. Kevin Spencer, along with engineer partners Patrick Hennessey and Brad MacKeil. Their mission: to establish a new global standard of care for a surprisingly common clinical problem that has outpaced legacy solutions.

“The problem we’re solving is stuck rings,” says Dr. Spencer.

While it may sound minor, ring entrapment can become serious.



“Fingers can swell for many reasons including heat, injury, illness and pregnancy to name a few,” says Dr. Spencer. “A snug ring can become a stuck ring and as swelling worsens, this can escalate into a finger-threatening tourniquet situation if not properly managed.”

The Ring Rescue team recognized an important gap and opportunity: rings had changed, but ring removal devices hadn’t.

“Over the past few decades, modern durable ring metals have become commonplace, with materials like tungsten carbide, titanium, and stainless steel now widely popular,” says Dr. Spencer. “But many healthcare settings still rely on outdated equipment that cannot manage modern rings.”

Ring Rescue’s first product was the Compression Device. It uses controlled, localized air pressure to reduce finger swelling, allowing a ring to slide off. But not every case could be resolved that way. That led to Ring Rescue’s second device: the Dolphin Ring Cutter, which safely cuts through all modern ring materials.

Ring Rescue products are now deployed in every emergency department across Nova Scotia, as well as in more than two thousand other sites across North America. Dr. Spencer says research in his home province showed improved patient outcomes, reduced delays, and meaningful cost savings.

“We’ve solved this medical problem exceptionally well.”

Customers now include many leading hospitals like Mayo Clinic, Cleveland Clinic and Mount Sinai. More than 46-thousand single-use cutting discs have been used in clinical care.

“Those discs represent thousands of real patients,” says Dr. Spencer. “Every one of those cases

needed a safe solution and without the right solution, these situations can become delayed, stressful, resource-intensive, and finger safety is on the line.”

One of the clearest examples of Ring Rescue’s impact comes from an 11-year old girl in Georgia who tried on a friend’s ring and couldn’t get it off. Her finger quickly became swollen and discoloured. After visits to two hospitals over six hours, surgery was becoming the only option, with concerns that her finger could be at risk.

By chance, an EMS supervisor was present who had access to Ring Rescue equipment, and within minutes the ring was safely removed.

“It’s a precise cut, it’s a reliable and safe approach, and preparedness matters in frontline care,” said EMS District Chief Michael Royal. Dr. Spencer adds “And in many cases, the ring can be repaired afterward.”

After a successful pitch on CBC’s ‘Dragon’s Den’, the company gained wider public awareness and momentum. Most recently, Ring Rescue was named one of Canada’s Top Growing Companies by The Globe and Mail.

Now, Ring Rescue is poised for perhaps its biggest spotlight yet.

The company’s devices are scheduled to appear on ‘The Pitt’, an HBO Max medical drama set in a Pittsburgh hospital. Dr. Spencer, a fan of the show, reached out to the creative team and later provided a demonstration to lead actor Noah Wyle at an emergency medicine conference in Salt Lake City. The episode featuring Ring Rescue is expected to air in March.

“It’s a great example of how the show stays grounded in real emergency medicine,” says Dr. Spencer. “To see a made-in-Nova Scotia innovation represented on that stage is exciting and it’s a major opportunity to raise awareness about a real clinical issue and the solution we provide.”

Even as Ring Rescue expands, Dr. Spencer continues to work shifts at Dartmouth General Hospital.

“Dartmouth General gave us the clinical proving ground to build the right product and keep improving it,” he says. “This included support from DGH Foundation, which provided a 3-D printer for staff use – something we absolutely leveraged in the early days for prototyping.”

The team and staff at Dartmouth General have become world experts in ring entrapment as a clinical condition, and hospital clinicians have generated several medical journal publications on the topic.

“This is the modern standard of care,” says Dr. Spencer. “That work started here at Dartmouth General, was adopted across Nova Scotia, and we’re now focused on expanding that footprint worldwide.”

Activities of Daily Living Suite Opens at DGH



Dartmouth General Hospital has a fully functioning, donor funded, Activities of Daily Living Suite. Our heartfelt thanks to the J&W Murphy Foundation, Harding Medical, Auction Advantage, Payzant Home Hardware, and many members of our community for their generosity.

This new purpose-built and thoughtfully designed suite mimics a home environment. It will be used by the DGH Occupational and Physical Therapy team to help assess what supports patients might need to return home safely.

The suite is designed to resemble a bachelor/studio apartment, complete with kitchenette, bathroom facilities, and sleeping area. Our skilled staff here at DGH assess a patient's abilities to safely maneuver around the suite, and conduct day-to-day activities such as bathing, cooking, and getting in and out of bed. After their assessment, recommendations are made for mobility aids and home modifications that will allow patients to return home safely.

Thanks to our generous donors for making the new Suite possible and getting patients home sweet home – safely.

African Nova Scotian and Mi'kmaq Bursary Celebration

We were thrilled to invite eight DGH Foundation bursary recipients to celebrate their educational accomplishments and their bright futures in healthcare. DGH is proud to offer four different bursary programs:

- **Annual Dartmouth General Hospital Foundation African Nova Scotian Healthcare Bursary** is a \$2,000 bursary available to African Nova Scotian students pursuing careers in health care from each of the six Dartmouth area high schools. In 2025, it was received by Victor Amani, Sara Teresa Makuate Ndock, Leyton Ngassa, Audrina Borden, Inez Cain, Kayla Walling, and Kiri Moore
- **DGH Staff Bursary Program** – up to 4 awarded each year to DGH staff of African ancestry who wish to upgrade their education (\$3,000 each).
- **DGHF & Horizon Maritime Mi'kmaq Learners Bursary** – \$3,000 bursary for Mi'kmaq learners entering NSCC in a healthcare-related field. The bursary is renewable for up to 3 years. The recipients for the 2024/25 awards: Jody, Kelsey, Meaghan, Mya, and Rebekah.
- **The Dartmouth General Hospital Foundation Bursary to Support Healthcare Education in People of African Ancestry, in honor of Yvonne Atwell.** This is for both the student and staff bursaries. This bursary was made possible by a generous gift from the J&W Murphy Foundation. This \$8000 renewable bursary was received by Jerica Smith-Howe in 2025.

Staff Profile:

Daniel Reyly - Physician Assistant at DGH

Meet Daniel Reyly, one of the Physician Assistants (PAs) working at the DGH Emergency Department. PAs were first introduced in NS in 2019 through a pilot program in Orthopedic Surgery. With the success of those first PAs, Nova Scotia Health now employs more than 20 PAs across the province. They are an impactful part of the team. PAs are excellent at delivering high quality patient care and deal with a wide range of simple to complex conditions.

“If you come into the Emergency Department, you may get seen that day by one of the physician assistants. My process begins with a comprehensive review of a patient’s history and a physical exam. Working closely with my supervising physician, I help determine a diagnosis and a path forward. I am responsible for ordering diagnostic tests and medications, performing necessary bedside procedures, and coordinating with specialty consultants. I place a high priority on patient education and counseling throughout the treatment process.”

Dartmouth General Hospital is the only emergency department in the Central Zone to have PAs and is one of only four emergency departments with PAs in Nova Scotia. Having this valuable resource helps to decrease wait times and free up capacity for physicians - knowing that they have a PA collaborating with them allows them to redirect their attention as needed.


“I’ve always believed that it’s important when I meet a patient that I introduce myself and I introduce what a PA is, what my capabilities are, and how I’m going to help them. I’ve yet to have a patient here that has had anything but gratitude for us getting more medical providers into the healthcare system.

Daniel is the first American PA in Nova Scotia, and currently part of the Interprofessional Practice and Learning Portfolio (IPPL) working to recruit new, experienced PAs in our province as well as helping transition into practice the new graduates of Dalhousie University’s Master of Physician Assistant Studies Program. This is a career choice that Daniel doesn’t hesitate to recommend to those looking to enter the healthcare field.

“When I’m speaking to anyone who is considering a medical profession I say absolutely become a physician assistant. I would choose to do it all over again – I think it’s a great career path. The education side is more of an accelerated pathway, so you can start working right away and continue to learn from your supervising physician. It’s very satisfying to get that investment from your education in a fairly quick turnaround.”

As for being at Dartmouth General Hospital, Daniel has nothing but great things to say about the staff and the community.

“The best thing that everyone talked about at Dartmouth General is the staff and the culture. The group of doctors are great and have been very supportive. So have all the nurses and the paramedics and NPs as well. It’s challenging work and can be intense at times, but the staff working here are so accepting and have a great team approach.”



Dartmouth General Hospital Foundation and the VanWart Kidney Innovation & Research Fund:

The exciting first-in-North America research project will improve future health outcomes for dialysis patients across Atlantic Canada, Canada and the world. This innovative research project utilizes leading-edge virtual reality technology to measure the cognitive and cardiac effects of dialysis on patients and is spearheaded by Dr. Karthik Tennankore.

The focus is enhancing dialysis care through wearable technology in the form of heart rate monitoring devices, oxygen saturation detectors and virtual reality (VR) tools. Results will assist diagnosis, behavior change and self-monitoring. The study will aid physicians and clinicians with the delivery of top-notch clinical care for dialysis patients and help avoid some of the negative side effects of treatment
